Stumbling Stones

is a project initiated by the artist Gunter Demnig to remember all people who were persecuted under the National Socialist regime.

What are Stumbling Stones?

Stumbling Stones are 10x10 cm concrete cubes with an upper surface made of engraved brass. Beginning in the year 1992, the artist Gunter Demnig has installed them in meanwhile 26 countries. Around 1000 of the small metal plates can be found on the pavements of Schöneberg and Tempelhof. Every Stumbling Stone is made by hand so that the industrial killing by the regime will not be followed by an industrially manufactured remembrance stone.

For whom are the Stumbling Stones installed?

Stumbling Stones are laid for all people who were persecuted, disenfranchised, deported or murdered in the Nazi period. The stones, which list the dates of birth and death of the victims, are installed in the public space in front of the last voluntarily chosen, self-determined residential address of the respective person.

How can I initiate the laying of a Stumbling Stone?

The first step in having a stone laid in Tempelhof-Schöneberg is to contact the district's coordination office. Since very many of the persecuted people lived in Schöneberg and only a limited number of stones can be made and laid each year, there might be a longer period of waiting.



How can I support the Stolperstein project?

It is possible to take on a sponsorship for a Stumbling Stone. This means to cover the cost of making the stone, to do independent research on the person affected, to search for possible family members who are still alive, and to write a short biography for the Stolperstein website. For new sponsorships the coordination office regularly offers introductions on how to conduct the research. You are also welcome to form research and sponsoring groups.

Another possibility is to take over archival research work for family members who live abroad and are therefore not able to do the research themselves.

We also welcome participation in the laying of the stones. Relatives from abroad are often present when the stones are installed. You can therefore also give your support by helping to organize their visit in Berlin, to offer a contribution for a little ceremony, or simply to attend the laying of the stone.

How can I inform myself about upcoming Stumbling Stone installations?

Upcoming Stolperstein ceremonies are regularly communicated via an email list sent by the coordination office and are also available on the homepage of the Tempelhof-Schöneberg Museums. Telephone enquiries can be addressed to the district's coordination office at phone number:
